Bindura University of Science Education's (BUSE) Artificial Intelligence (AI) engine, Titus, impressed a delegation of Parliament of Zimbabwe officials, led by Speaker of the House Adv Jacob Mudenda during a recent tour of the University to explore areas of collaboration within the AI spectrum.

Titus was developed by BUSE software developers and is customized to understand and interact in several indigenous languages. It can explain complex concept in Shona, Ndebele, Chewa, Shangani, Swahili and Zulu.

Speaking during a briefing, BUSE Vice Chancellor, Prof. Eddie Mwenje highlighted the need for training in AI tools as well as developing policies to guide the use of AI.

"As BUSE, we have developed an AI policy which informs the use of AI in academic and professional work. This policy is a leap forward in embracing AI as a tool for development and progress.

"Training in AI is important as AI opens a world of opportunities and possibilities which were previously unimaginable," said Prof Mwenje.

Adv Mudenda commended BUSE's boldness in embracing AI.

"I am impressed that you already have an AI policy and have developed Titus which is customized to our indigenous languages.

"I am sure we can collaborate further in AI and develop systems that can streamline some Parliament operations to make them more efficient," said Adv Mudenda.

Clerk of Parliament, Mr Kennedy Chokuda was present at the meeting and echoed Adv Mudenda's sentiments on the University's progress in integrating AI in academic and professional work.

Several collaborations are expected to emerge from the engagement.

Contestants have used traditional foods as a foundation for new dishes and techniques while inspiring modern food development and preserving Zimbabwe's cultural heritage. Coinciding with BUSE's Silver Jubilee, the competition reflected the University's commitment to fostering innovation and entrepreneurship using the heritage-based education 5.0 philosophy.

BUSE proudly fielded contestants in both the student and professional chef categories, with one of the students Deleen Zengeya, securing a coveted spot to represent Mashonaland Central at the national finals in Harare.

Adding to the celebration, Mrs Nancy Gwata, a BUSE representative, claimed third place in the Professional Chefs category, further cementing the University's ingenuity in culinary excellence.

Guest of honour at the event, the Deputy Minister of Tourism and Hospitality Industry, Honourable Tongai Mnangagwa, urged the participants to continue to enhance their skills and transform the knowledge gained into socio-economic benefits.

"Since its inception, the programme has bred women and youths who have gone regional and international, exporting their products. Some have formed companies and have contracts with large organisations on terms of supplying traditional foods," said Hon. Mnangagwa

"The quest to provide traditional dishes during events, conferences and even social functions has grown significantly. This has resulted in job creation, especially along supply chains."

The National Cookout Competition is the brainchild of the First Lady of the Republic of Zimbabwe, Dr. Auxillia Mnangagwa and is a platform to showcase cultural diversity, celebrate diverse foods and a means to address food security issues in Africa.

ACADEMY PROTEGE SHINES FOR ZIMBABWE

The Southern Region All Africa Challenge Trophy tournament, recently held in Windhoek, Namibia, was an unforgettable experience. As one of the region's most prestigious golfing events, it brought together talented female golfers from several countries, all competing for glory.

For me, it was particularly special as it was my first time being part of the Zimbabwe team for SR-AACT an opportunity that was both exhilarating and humbling.

Our journey began on March 30th, when we travelled to Namibia, excited and eager for the competition ahead. The following day, was dedicated to practice, allowing us to familiarize ourselves with the course and sharpen our strategies. When the tournament officially commenced, the atmosphere was electric, with teams battling it out on the fairways, demonstrating skill, precision and resilience.

Zimbabwe was represented by three players myself, Tracy Humbira, along with Batsirai Tilowakuti and Miriam Masiya. Our team was managed by Olivia Nyamwanza, the president of the Zimbabwe Ladies Golf Union, whose leadership and support were invaluable.

Together, we faced strong competition, particularly from the South African team, who

dominated the leaderboard with impressive performances.

After three intense rounds, Zimbabwe secured second place, finishing as runner-up with a total score of 490. South Africa claimed victory with 450, while Namibia followed in third place with 529. Eswatini and Lesotho took fourth and fifth, scoring 537 and 609, respectively. Despite missing the top spot, our team played with determination and heart, earning recognition for our efforts.

On an individual level, I finished in 9th place out of 18 players, achieving a total score of 258 across the tournament's three rounds. Competing at this level was a personal milestone, pushing me to grow, adapt, and refine my game under pressure. The experience was invaluable, and the stroke taught me something about the sport and myself.
