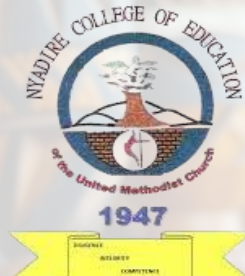
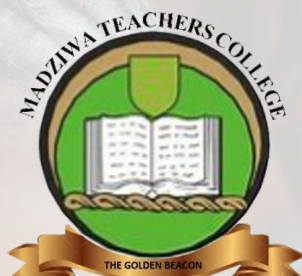

Ultimately, it seeks to strengthen collaboration and excellence in higher education, research, and policy - positioning AIKS at the centre of Africa's path toward a resilient, self-determined future.

A Message from the Conference Committee

Following the strong response to our previous call and numerous requests from prospective contributors, the African Association for the Study of Indigenous Knowledge Systems (AASIKS), together with the Local Organising Committee at Bindura University of Science Education (BUSE), is pleased to issue this third and final Call for Submissions for the 9th Annual International Conference.

The abstract submission deadline has been extended to give more scholars, practitioners, community knowledge holders, policymakers, students, and innovators the opportunity to contribute to this landmark continental gathering. The notification of acceptance and revised abstract deadlines have been adjusted accordingly. All other dates, including early-bird registration, final registration, and the full-paper submission window, remain unchanged. The conference venue has been moved to Baradzanwa Cultural Village. We warmly invite you to be part of a conference that is centring African Indigenous Knowledge at the heart of Africa's resilient, self-determined future.

Rationale

Globally, communities face climate change, environmental degradation, persistent inequality, food insecurity, youth unemployment, and systemic exclusion in knowledge production - challenges that expose the limits of dominant and hegemonic paradigms and underscore the urgency of recentring Indigenous epistemologies to shape just, resilient, and sustainable futures. Concurrently, emerging technologies - including AI, big data, and digital preservation - pose risks of cultural erasure while also creating opportunities for revitalisation, documentation, and sovereignty when guided by Indigenous values and governance. This conference situates Indigenous Knowledge Systems (IKS) as co-equal, future-making knowledge for policy, education, innovation, and sustainable development.

The conference also advances the African Union Agenda 2063, particularly Aspiration 5: "An Africa with a strong cultural identity, common heritage, shared values and ethics." It further impacts Aspirations 1 and 6, as well as Science, Technology, and Innovation (STI) priorities under continental frameworks, by fostering dialogue among Indigenous knowledge holders, researchers, technologists, and policymakers to co-create hybrid knowledge systems suited to African realities. In essence, the conference seeks to deepen the advancement of Indigenous Knowledge Systems not as outdated traditions, but as significant pillars of Africa's knowledge economy, epistemic transformation, and sustainable development agenda.

Conference Aims & Objectives

- Position IKS as a robust paradigm for social, cultural, educational, economic, and ecological transformation.
- Nurture inclusive innovation ecosystems that recognise communities as co-producers of knowledge.
- Deepen ethical and methodological standards for IKS-centred scholarship and community-engaged decolonial research.
- Shape governance and policy frameworks that protect intellectual property (IP), data sovereignty, and community rights.
- Strengthen inter-, multi-, and trans-disciplinary collaboration among communities, academia, government, and industry.
- Position Africa as a thought leader in global exchanges on decoloniality, sustainability, and knowledge pluralism.

Expected Outcomes

Upon completion of this conference, participants and stakeholders can anticipate the following tangible outcomes:

- A comprehensive set of policy recommendations for integrating AIKS into national development frameworks across Africa.
- Enhancement of the pan-African research network on Indigenous Knowledge Systems, facilitating collaborative research projects and knowledge exchange across institutions.
- Development of ethical guidelines and best practices for community-engaged IKS research, to be adopted by participating universities and research institutions.
- Publication of an edited volume featuring peer-reviewed papers from the conference, targeting publication with reputable academic publishers.
- Formation of thematic working groups to advance specific areas of IKS research and application beyond the conference.
- Enhanced visibility and recognition of Indigenous Knowledge Systems in global academic and policy discourse.

- Land-based knowledge and holistic ecological wisdom.

- Indigenous governance systems and institutions.
- Rights-based approaches and comparative policy analysis.
- Land, identity, equity, restorative justice, and conflict resolution.

Track 5: Cultural, Creative & Economic Expressions of IKS

- Arts, crafts, heritage, language, tourism, and creative industries.
- Indigenous entrepreneurship, livelihoods, and community economies.
- Makers' innovations and cultural markets.

Track 6: Quality Education & Knowledge Transmission

- Integrating IKS across STEM, social sciences, humanities, commerce, and educational curricula.
- Inclusive education, heritage-based education, and community learning systems.
- Indigenous Knowledge Integrated Quality assurance in across educational fields.
- Revitalising endangered languages, oral traditions, and knowledge transfer.
- Diaspora participation, and transnational exchanges.
- Translation challenges and epistemic loss.
- Multilingual publishing and scholarly communication in African languages.
- Sign languages and Indigenous deaf communities.

Track 7: Safety, Health and Wellness

- Traditional healing knowledge and practitioners
- Ethnobotany and medicinal plant sovereignty
- IKS in public health responses (including pandemics)
- Mental health and indigenous wellbeing frameworks.

Contribution & Presentation Formats

AASIKS invites scholars, researchers, practitioners, community knowledge holders, policymakers, students, artists, and innovators to submit abstracts for the 2026 Annual International Conference. To encourage inclusive participation, the conference welcomes the following submission types:

- **Research Paper - Progressing Paper** (≤6,000 to ≤ 8,000 words including references when complete)
- **Research Paper - Full Paper** (≤6,000 to ≤ 8,000 words including references)
- **Published Paper(s)**- From 2024 to date
- **Posters, Panels & Roundtables**: thematic groupings, debates, and collaborative dialogues.
- **Symposia**: multi-presentation sessions organised around a unifying problem, method, or region.
- **Community-Led Presentations**: contributions from elders, knowledge holders, practitioners, and case-based storytelling.
- **Practice & Case Studies**: applied insights drawn from community or sector projects.
- **Cultural & Makers Showcase**: curated demonstrations, performances, crafts, and innovation exhibits.



Abstract and Submission Guidelines

We invite you to submit abstracts for symposium, individual paper, and poster presentations by 15 July 2026.

Abstract Requirements (Extended)

- Length: summary of the key components of the paper in 5-0700 words.
- Insert title, track/sub-theme
- List all authors, affiliations, and contact details as required. Please indicate the corresponding author if there is more than one author.
- Provide background, context, significance, and purpose of the study. Objectives / Problem Statement and State the main research question(s) or objective(s) or hypothesis, Summarise the methodology, including design data sources, tools, or analytical techniques
- Present key findings, trends, or outcomes without figures or tables with discussions or separately and a conclusion.
- Include: 3-5 keywords
- Formatting: APA 7th Edition; Times New Roman 12 pt; MS Word (.doc/.docx) only (no PDFs).
